Things to do in Philadelphia

1. The Liberty Bell Centre:

One of the nicest things to do in Philly today is to check out the Liberty Bell Center. Nearly a century after it was cast, the Liberty Bell famously cracked. It was attempted to be repaired in time for George Washington's birthday, but without success. Since then, there has been no further ringing of the bell.

The Liberty Bell is housed in a big glass building across from Independence Hall. It was designed for the 50th anniversary of the US Constitution and has since become an international symbol for those fighting for freedom and abolition.

2. The Independence Hall:

See, the Liberty Bell Center is one of the best things to do in Philadelphia in Christmas. The famously broken bell may not chime, but its symbolic significance is clear.

Infamously, the Liberty Bell broke down after being hung for nearly a century. There were futile efforts to fix it before George Washington's birthday. There has been no more bell-ringing since then.

Across the street from Independence Hall is a large glass structure where the Liberty Bell is kept. Created for the 50th anniversary of the US Constitution, it has become a global symbol of freedom and abolitionist movements.

3. The Benjamin Franklin Parkway:

The Benjamin Franklin Parkway is another fantastic area of Philadelphia that is jam-packed with sights. It was modeled after the Champs-Élysées in Paris.

But the parkway is not about history at all; it is dedicated to the creative process. You'll find the Barnes Foundation, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and the Franklin Institute in this artistic core of the city.

The gorgeous street runs diagonally through downtown between City Hall, Fairmount Park, and the Schuylkill River. With a cup of coffee in hand, you may enjoy a lovely morning stroll full of interesting stops. Visiting all of the museums, galleries, and attractions, including the famous Rocky Statue, might take many days. Further, the parkway can answer your question about things to do in Philadelphia during Christmas week.

4. Delaware River Waterfront:

Larger ships had to find alternative docking locations for years; therefore, the piers along the Delaware River Waterfront were abandoned. The waterfront, however, has been revitalized thanks to an effective

urban renewal plan, drawing back crowds of visitors. The scenic New Jersey skyline and the iconic Benjamin Franklin Bridge can be seen from the Delaware River Waterfront.

And that's not all. The well-known Cherry Street Pier may be seen on the riverfront. The Cherry Street Pier is an old city wharf that now showcases the city's culture and heritage. Exhibits of local and international art are on display all year long, and there are frequent market days and a stage for concerts.
